Title: Multisensory storytelling, disability, and celebrating difference

Drawing on crip theory, this presentation explores how sensory methods in research designs can mitigate ableism. Citing several examples, this presentation will consider how connection and community can inform the engagement of sensory modalities in understanding first-person narratives.
