## 2. SUMMARY OF PROFESSIONAL RECORD

**Professor Ben Mathews**, PhD, LLB, BA(Hons), is a Professor in the School of Law at QUT and is Principal Research Fellow in the Faculty of Law. He is Director of QUT's cross-Faculty *Childhood Adversity Research Program*. He is an internationally recognised researcher on law and child maltreatment, with expertise in the prevention, detection, and response to child abuse and neglect by legal and social systems, within a framework of law, public health, social justice and children's rights. Research expertise in child sexual abuse is a particular strength.

From 2015-17 he was a Professorial Fellow to the Australian Government *Royal Commission Into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse*. He is an Adjunct Professor at Johns Hopkins University, Bloomberg School of Public Health, a Member of two WHO Guideline Development Groups, Overseas Fellow of the Royal Society of Medicine, a member of committees on child protection administered by the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children, and member of the editorial board of the leading international journal *Child Abuse & Neglect*.

Ben's work focuses on multidisciplinary research at the interface of law and child maltreatment. His research analyses the impact of law, policy, education and skill development in lived experience, and the study of law and policy as an agent of change. He uses a range of research methodologies spanning legal and policy analysis; analysis of law and society informed by psychological and medical evidence; social science analysis; conceptual analysis; ethical analysis; systematic reviews (PRISMA); time trend analysis of the impact of law and policy in lived experience; qualitative and quantitative studies; national and state longitudinal studies using big data sets over 10 years and 20 years; logic models; comparative analysis of legal systems; historical analysis of law and society; randomised controlled trials of educational interventions (CONSORT); and public health and regulatory analysis.

He is highly experienced in research project design and administration, and is an experienced leader of large multidisciplinary teams involving national and international collaborators. He is skilled in negotiating research with end-user groups, from both public and private sectors. In over a dozen large research projects, he has demonstrated a capacity to complete projects with outstanding and usable outcomes for funding bodies and external partners.

## Publications overview

Ben has authored 3 books, and over 70 peer-reviewed journal articles and book chapters. His citations exceed disciplinary norms (Scopus h-index 11, 464 citations; Google Scholar h-index 19, 1260 citations), and is the highest cited researcher in the QUT School of Law. He publishes in the leading journals in his field, as a sole author, as first author on collaborative work, and as a contributor to other articles. In addition, he has published 18 major government reports (including three major projects for the Royal Commission Into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse), over 20 law reform submissions on issues concerning children and the law, and over 40 international conference papers.

## Research impact, collaboration and engagement

Ben has conducted large, end-user focused research projects for the Australian Government, the Victorian Government, the New South Wales Government, and the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, and other projects in partnership with the governments of Queensland, New South Wales and Western Australia, and NGOs involved in sexual abuse prevention in child and youth-serving organisations.

The results of his research and engagement with government and industry have produced exceptional research impact. Research findings have influenced multiple socio-legal reforms to enhance children's safety and the betterment of society. Research findings have been widely used by Australian and overseas governments and industries, including school systems, to reform legislation, policy and practice. These reforms have been especially strong in the law, policy and practice of reporting child abuse and neglect (especially for sexual abuse and physical abuse); the education of teachers and other early childhood professionals in dealing with child abuse, and the reform of statutes of limitation to enable survivors of child sexual abuse to sue wrongdoers in the civil court system.

This exceptional impact was recognised by the QUT Vice Chancellor's Award for High-Impact Research in 2015. In addition, his body of work was selected as QUT's Discipline of Law case study for research impact in the Australian Government's 2018 Excellence in Research for Australia assessment (ERA), evaluating the social and legal impact of research nationally and internationally over a 6 year period (2011-2016). ## Major scientific contributions to the international field

Ben has researched complex and pressing problems, making substantial advances to scientific knowledge. Key research discoveries include:

**1. 7 year pre- and post-mandatory reporting law study:** From the first study of its kind: conducting an empirical study of law as an intervention variable, showing through a 7 year pre- and post-analysis in an Australian state of child sexual abuse reporting data that introduction of a new legal obligation to report CSA results in significantly improved systemic performance and social justice (Mathews et al., 2016, *Child Abuse & Neglect*).

**2. 20 year study of reporting of child sexual abuse:** From the first empirical 20 year longitudinal study in an Australian state of reporting data for CSA: finding that there is not a sustained increase in reporting, but there may be positive and beneficial increases at specific times, influenced by a confluence of social factors (especially for boys) (Mathews et al., 2017, *Child Abuse & Neglect*).

**3. Randomised controlled trial of an educational intervention:** From an RCT in an American state (n=741): finding that a tailored online educational program increases the knowledge, capacity and attitudinal dispositions of early childhood education and care practitioners regarding duties to report child abuse and neglect (Mathews et al., 2017, *PLoS ONE*).

**4. International systematic legal review:** From the first multinational systematic review and analysis of mandatory reporting laws: finding that multiple significant differences exist between mandatory reporting laws for child abuse and neglect in jurisdictions in the USA, Canada and Australia (Mathews & Kenny, 2008, *Child Maltreatment*, 104 citations in Scopus).

**5. Multidisciplinary analysis of mandatory reporting laws:** From a legal, theoretical and philosophical analysis: concluding that mandatory reporting laws are required for severe child abuse and neglect (Mathews & Bross, 2008, *Child Abuse & Neglect*: 31 citations in Scopus).

**6. 3-state comparative study:** From the first empirical three state comparative study of law and teacher knowledge, attitude and practice: the presence of a legal obligation and associated education produces superior reporting performance by primary school teachers of CSA, and produces superior knowledge of and attitudes towards the duty (Mathews et al., 2009, *UNSW Law Review*).

**7. National study of child protection systems:** From a national Australian comparative study over 10 years across every state and territory of law and practice regarding the reporting of all forms of child abuse and neglect: there are substantially different reporting patterns for different reporter groups, different maltreatment types, with major implications for different child protection systemic response approaches (Mathews et al., 2015: Vols 1-9).

**8. Statutes of limitation:** From analysis using legal, theoretical and psychological perspectives: conventional civil law statutes of limitation for child sexual abuse claims are unjustifiable and should be abolished, and this reform can be accommodated practicably by legal systems (Mathews, 2003, *Torts Law Journal*; >14,000 downloads).

**9. Conceptual model of child sexual abuse:** From conceptual, legal and developmental analysis of child sexual abuse, this work solves a problem that has confronted the international field since the 1970s. Contention has surrounded what acts should be considered as child sexual abuse. This review and analysis found:

- (1) the concept of “child” should be analysed from dual perspectives of developmental capacity and legal chronological age of adulthood;
- (2) the concept of consent must be considered at face validity of apparent surface consent, and experientially by asking whether true consent exists, which requires full, free, voluntary and uncoerced participation;
- (3) the concept of “sexual” should embrace contact and non-contact acts done for the purpose of seeking or obtaining physical or mental sexual gratification, whether immediate or deferred temporally or spatially, as well as the child’s experience of the act;
- (4) the term “abuse” possesses a heightened wrongfulness derived from the unconscionability of the acts, which flows from four indicia: a relationship of power; the child being in a position of inequality; the child’s vulnerability being exploited to her or his detriment; and absence of true consent (Mathews & Collin-Vezina, 2017, *Trauma, Violence & Abuse*).

**10. The need for a new ethic of technology to reduce childhood adversity.** From analysis using legal, theoretical and psychological perspectives, and considerations of children’s rights, human dignity, and Martha Nussbaum’s capabilities approach, there is an urgent need to develop a new ethic of technology for the 21<sup>st</sup> century environment to protect and promote children’s safe use of technology. This has major implications nationally and internationally for law and regulation, ethics, corporate practice, health services, and educational systems (Mathews, 2019, *New international frontiers in child sexual abuse: Theory, problems and progress*).
